
Course Syllabus

Welcome to the Syllabus for Cinema 4, Reality and Documentary Film History! This course will examine the history of the development of documentary films, with examples, from their beginnings to the present day. Emphasis will be placed on the American documentaries, and you will find this course to be quite fun.

Course Description: In Cinema 4, students examine the development of films dealing with the truth. Nonfiction films seen and discussed include: historical animated, propaganda, educational, commercial, personal and participatory, cinema verite and direct cinema. Students will develop critical standards for judging documentary films.

Student Learning Outcomes: Students will examine documentary films in terms of film content, technology and technique. Students will demonstrate critical standards in identifying a major documentary film, filmmaker and its historical influences. Students could demonstrate critical standards with a paper showing in identifying a major documentary film, filmmaker and its historical influences.



Attendance and Exclusion: You are expected to log in and complete assignments and discussions on a regular basis. If you do not meet these requirements, the instructor may exclude you, therefore dropping you from the course. However, it is your responsibility to ensure that you withdraw from the course to avoid receiving a D or F, rather than assuming that you will be dropped.

Withdrawing from a Class: If you must drop a course, drop before the specified deadline for dropping a class without a grade of "W." Dropping after that date will result in a "W" on your transcript. Effective July 1, 2012 students will only have 3 attempts to pass a class. If a student gets a "W" or grade of "D", "F", "I", or "NP" in a class, that will count as an attempt. A student's past record of course attempts district wide will also be considered. Therefore, before the above date, you should carefully consider if you can reasonably manage this course with the other factors in your life (e.g. work, family, course load). You may also drop later to receive a "W" in the class. If you have any questions, email the teacher before that date.

Evaluation: Grading in this course is based on a cumulative number of 1000 points earned from quizzes, essays, and projects. Grades are assigned on a percentage basis. Up to 3 Extra Credit assignments may be used to boost your points if you are falling behind.

900 - 1000 points: 90% - 100% = A

800 - 899 points: 80% - 89% = B

700 - 799 points: 70% - 79% = C

600 - 699 points: 60% - 69% = D

< 600 points: < 60% = F

Grading Will Cover:

- 1. 2 quizzes from lectures and readings: Worth 50 points each, starting at a designated time and ending at a designated time. All students must take quiz within this time.
- 2. 1 Midterm from lectures and readings: Worth 100 points. No make-up tests will be given. The exam will start at a designated time and end at a designated time. All students must take the exam within this time.
- 3. 1 Final Examination from lectures and readings: Worth 100 points. No make-up tests will be given. The exam will start at a designated time and end at a designated time. All students must take the exam within this time.
- 4. 5 projects: Worth 100 points each.
- 5. Class participation: Worth a total of 200 points.
- 6. Periodic Extra Credit assignments: Worth 30 points each.
